

As I write this letter it is April 30th and the big day for our inaugural MRAS Spring Market! I am very excited to dust off my pull cart and load it up with fresh, local produce. I hope that you also have the opportunity to visit the spring market and find some Mother's Day gifts for the important ladies in your lives.

We have been very busy over the past month preparing for the 2022 season. I am delighted to report that **Burgardt's Butcher Shop** will be renting the MRAS concession for the season. After 2 long years without a tenant, we are very pleased to see a business operating in this space again. Thank you to Melonie and Brent for managing the request for proposals and for working through the contract details with Burgardt's. Please let Melonie and Shayla know what you think of their offerings, they are open to tweaking the menu to best meet our customers' tastes.

I also have an exciting update on the MRAS playground initiative. We

have received approximately **\$20,000** in donations to date and plan to start the groundwork for this initiative in May and early June, prior to the start of the summer market season. Our friends Clayton and Lainey at <u>Acreage Development Solutions</u> have kindly offered to donate a portion of the cost of scrub clearance and top soil removal to make this a possibility. After ground clearing, we will place a wooden border around the playground area and cover it with specialized wood chips. This area will be used all summer to host fundraising games and events aimed at families and building support for our initiative. In addition, we will be launching a "name a brick" campaign shortly. Blaine Clark has kindly agreed to lead this project and we are excited to start working on it in the month of May. More details to follow.

We will also be hosting a **Benefit Concert** for the playground on **Saturday July 16, 2022, at 3pm**. Award winning band <u>Drew Gregory</u> of Strathmore and <u>Brayden King</u> of Edmonton will be performing in the arena from 3 to 6pm. This is a family orientated event, so bring your children and grandchildren to enjoy some live music. Food will be available from local food trucks, and we will have a bar selling both alcoholic and non-alcoholic beverages.



ALBERT STUART CANNON 1871 - 1932

Albert arrived in Calgary (how it was spelled then) on April 17 having come to Canada in 1889. He came West via Winnipeg, after taking the ferry across the St. Lawrence and onto Carlton Junction where he caught the CPR train. In Calgary he was met by Jack Ellis and after spending the night they went on to the UP ranch at Pine Creek. In his words, Albert started his "career as a wild and woolly cowboy by climbing on a cayuse bareback and driving in four milk cows." He stayed at the UP for a year and then at B.S. Lloyd's for three years gaining more experience.

Albert went to work for Joseph Fisher trailing JN horses as far as the Little Bow for grazing. Some of the horses he trained ended up in the Calgary Fire Department. From here he worked also for John Ware and Johnny Quirk, spring and fall round-up and branding.

Albert managed to fix up a shack for the winter and springtime found him working with John Ware herding cattle north and south of Calgary. He remembers one night when there was an awful storm - thunder and lightning was crashing. John Ware sat shaking in his saddle as he remembered a previous experience with lightning. He was driving his democrat to Sheppard when lightning struck his team and killed them and tore the boot off his brake foot.

Albert cooked for Sam Howe on that roundup which was made more interesting as the Sheep River was in full flood at that time. This was the wettest and most eventful round-up Albert was ever on.

In 1900 Albert homesteaded on Section 10-21-2-W5. His wife Miriam came to Canada in 1913 and they were married in June 1914 in Calgary. They had three children – Helen May b 1917 – David Stuart b 1918 – Nevill b 1921. David stayed on the farm and his son Lloyd farms it now and his daughter Ali married Gord Pain farming on one quarter of Albert's homestead. Nevill became an Air Force mechanic in WWII, farmed after the war and then continued as a mechanic in Okotoks.

Helen Cannon married Francis Sinclair-Smith and had two children - Cathie and Stuart. Cathie and Jim Scatterty married in 1959 and they built their house on family land. Stuart and Ruby Lowe married in 1963 and ranch on the original family land in the original stone house.

When Sheilagh Jameson interviewed Miriam in 1958, Miriam shared that A.S. Cannon always liked

race horses and he raised and raced them for many years. Many early race programme cards and Millarville race meet posters dated from 1906 onward showing Mr. Cannon as an owner and competitor. Their racing colors were chocolate and blue. Stuart competed in all the race meetings around and owned some very good race horses.

Miriam and Stuart were supporters of Christ Church Millarville for many years. A.S. Cannon acted as Clergyman's Warden from 1919 – 1927 and served on the vestry at various times. Mrs. Cannon was one of the original members of the Millarville Ladies' Guild. An incredible beginning to many generations of remarkable family traditions and community-mindedness!

Dedicated Local Volunteers Don and Fern Ward

Fern has been active in Country Lane Quilting Guild, too, creating and donating numerous charity quilts given to people in need. Don has also been actively involved in Foothills Search and Rescue and Lion's Club. As one volunteers, the other offers support.



Don was recently recognized with the inaugural Don Ward Lifetime Achievement Award for his decades of service with Foothills Search and Rescue, a group that he helped found and has actively volunteered with for 30 years. Please read the Western Wheel April 27th article which highlights his many accomplishments with that organization.Don is a perpetual parking squad leader with more than 30 years of experience at Millarville Races, Priddis and Millarville Fair and other high profile MRAS events, along with a team of volunteers. He offers his services even

on freezing Alberta days, outside for 7–8 hour shifts. Don is masterful in problem solving, uses humor to respectfully negotiate individual parking "needs" and gives selflessly, going above and beyond. Walking around outside, greeting visitors, and directing them to parking spaces is something he really enjoys. Don eagerly gives a thumbs up when he is offered a hot chocolate on cold days!

Other volunteers who work closely with Don describe his business-like abilities in organizing parking, calm even when it is very hectic and drivers not necessarily patient. Don has a real commanding presence, even though he isn't a big man; his demeanor demands respect from others. Safety is important and he gets people to listen and has taught other volunteers how to effectively use hand signals, get eye contact from drivers, and create efficient parking flow patterns. He has an incredible talent in managing the entire "landscape" and strategically plans how to "fit" the most vehicles in any space, alleviate traffic jams and quickly restructures plans when issues arise. Don wants everyone to remember that "We are here for a good time!", working cooperatively with others, with a smile on his face.

Don and Fern are very happily retired in Millarville - God's country and both have dedicated time and energy to improve our community for everyone to enjoy. Thank you both for your perseverance!

Lindy Barron Riding Clinic

MRAS is thrilled to have Lindy Barron instructing a one-day riding clinic on Saturday, May 28.

In this clinic participants will be working on refining skills through a series of exercises and riding drills with the goal of riding competitive patterns with finesse.

The focus will be on developing even better communication and consistent messaging with your horse. This will encourage riders to have more invisible ques to achieve greater success with each maneuver. To this end transitions, guide, speed and body control for both horse and rider will be key elements in this clinic since these are all very important tools to riding an accurate well executed pattern. Participants will then put practice to perfection and ride a pattern. Lindy will critique each rider so when the day is done participants will feel accomplished and ready to ride any pattern with skill and ease. The pattern may include some aids such as poles, rails etc.

In order to get the most from this clinic it is expected that the rider and horse are comfortable at all gaits including a lope with good guide, can stop their horse on command, side pass and back up.

Riders will be divided into two groups with a maximum of 5 riders in each group. You will ride once in the morning and once in the afternoon.

Group 1 – 9 to 10:30 am and 1 to 2:30 pm

Group 2 – 10:30 am to noon and 2:30 to 4 pm

A minimum number of participants is necessary for this clinic to go ahead so please register as soon as possible <u>MRAS.equine@gmail.com</u>. Once the minimum number has been reached payment instructions will be sent to you.

JESSE O'BRIEN RIDING CLINIC

MRAS is excited to have Jesse O'Brien return for a one-day riding clinic Sunday, June 26, 2022. For more information about Jesse, see attached biography.

Horsemanship and Patterns with Obstacles will be the focus of this clinic:

Part A - Horsemanship

- lateral movements (side pass, turn on the forehand)
- spins (turns on the haunches)
- stops
- speed transitions at all gates

Part B - Obstacle Work

- working through a Ranch Horse Versatility pattern using the skills learned in Part A. - desensitizing horses, if required

- obstacles could include: opening and closing a free-standing gate, bridge,

side pass over rails (beginner & advanced), backing through rails (beginner & advanced), carrying a slicker from point A to B, log pull and so on...

- there will be time to practice and a fun "show" with critique at the end of your group

Riders will be divided into two groups, maximum of ten (10) per group. Each group will ride once in the morning and once in the afternoon.

Group I: 9:00am-10:30am and 1:00pm – 2:30pm Group II: 10:30am – 12:00pm and 2:30pm – 4:00pm

In order for participants to get the most from this clinic, groups will be arranged based on previous experience and riding levels. Please provide any information that may be helpful when you send your registration request. Based on the clinic information and the skills described, how would you best describe you and the horse you are bringing: A) just learning, B) pretty good, C) very good, or D) refining skills.

A minimum number of participants are required per session; therefore, payment instructions will be provided following the registration deadline. If you are interested in this clinic, please contact <u>MRAS.equine@gmail.com</u> as soon as possible.



MILLARVILLE 130TH BIRTHDAY

In a conversation with Tim Baby at the Millarville General Store we got to talking about the history of this vital business in this area. Tim had found a postal stamp dated April of 1892 and that would make this store 130 years old. It was decided by the Directors and Executive of the Millarville Historical Society to honour our community. So, on August 7 at 1 P. M. at the Millarville Race Track we will be celebrating this milestone. In attendance will be representatives of the families that have owned and operated the Millarville General Store. The afternoon will be filled with reminiscence and stories of the founding and building of our community. So, please put this date on the calendar as it will be a wonderful opportunity to meet old and new friends and share your family history in the area. For the newer residents it is a chance to learn the history and see why this is such a great community.

Malcolm Tanner Millar came to Canada in 1879 and in 1880 he joined the RNWMP as Constable No. 429. He came west via Fort Benson and to Fort Walsh. Here he ran the Post Office at the fort. He was discharged on July 27, 1885, and came to the North Fork of Sheep Creek almost immediately and homesteaded SE12-21-3-W5 on June 21st. He left the RNWMP on May 9 but was not Discharged until later.

He settled the homestead quickly and was preempted NW12-21-3-W5 and here he established a trading post and a police outpost in 1889. He was sworn in as postmaster in April 1892.

In 1910 when Mr. Millar gave up the Post Office and General Store, W. H. King built a store up on the hill north of his house above the present site of Millarville. It had a room for the post office in the back of the building, living quarters upstairs and a basement for storage. He ran this business for several years, with the help of Frank Shaw and later Humphrey Brewis from 1916 to 1918.

In 1919 Luke Forward and Enoch and Annie Walton had bought the Millarville General Store from W. H. King. In 1920 they also bought the Kew store, so Annie stayed in Millarville to run that business. Luke bought a truck and started the first trucking business in the district. He hauled cream or anything else to Calgary. On his return trips he brought back the empty cream cans, groceries for both stores, and any goods that the ranchers would order.

In the 1920's the mail was delivered to Millarville and Kew twice a week, on Tuesdays and Fridays. The locals looked forward to these days and the horses were hitched to the railing at both stores while the owners were inside, buying gum and candy, and exchanging news and stories. In the 1930's Luke became ill, and Jim Colley took over the hauling of mail and groceries for both stores. Annie became very ill, and after being bedridden for quite a long time she passed away in 1937. Enoch died in the early 40's and Ford Lochead took over the Kew store and Norman Pegler entered the scene. Luke returned east to live with his daughters.

Norman Pegler opened a new store about half a mile west of the Millarville post office and then later took over the post office. Norman after serving with the Lord Strathcona Horse returned to Canada and operated a store at Dalroy. In 1925 he married Marguerite Travers. In 1926 they came to Millarville and bought a small acreage from Ted Rawlinson. The Pegler's built the store here. Norman had a truck and made his runs to Calgary via the Weasel Head Hill, which could be snow or mud blocked, and he never knew how long a round trip would take.

Keeping a store running during the "Hungry Thirties" presented many problems, and it was during this period the Pegler's made many friends because of their kindness.

In August 1941 the post office was moved to Pegler's and had been run by Angus MacKay after Mrs. Walton's death. The Pegler's continued with the store and post office until 1944 when they sold the business to D. W. "Jappy" Douglas, a grandson of Malcolm Millar.

Jappy was born and grew up on the Hillside Ranch 8 miles west of Okotoks. In the fall of 1918, he married Lulu Hamilton from Okotoks. When Mr. Pegler sold it to Jappy Douglass in 1944 it was just in time for the oil boom. This brought many new residents to the district and the store reaped some of the benefits. Jappy built a coffee shop and moved the McFarland Lumber Yard from High River and attached it to the store.

In 1956 Jappy was injured in a shotgun accident and sold the store to Mr. and Mrs. Carl Orthner who stayed for two years. Clark Jacobson took over and built the store up but sold out in 1959. Nora Andrews served as postmaster for the Orthner's and for Clark.

Arlie Laycraft and his wife Veryl and son Ron took over in 1959 and ran the store for 15 years. They put much into the store with improvements and also the daily mail came to Millarville and the Rural Route was carried by Clark Jacobson which he did rain, snow or shine.

In 1968 Ron decided to go to university and so Arlie and Veryl bought out his share and carried on until arthritis affected Arlie and in 1974, they sold out to Nick and Janet Cooke from Okotoks, after selling their house in Okotoks and a Coin Laundry business in Calgary.

Nick and Janett Cooke ran the store until 1978 when they sold to Mr. and Mrs. John Clarke of Calgary and moved to Vancouver. Karen became the new postmaster and Nick took over when Clark Jacobson wished to retire. John was electrocuted when they had a pump problem in the basement.

Rick and Pam Shindrick and Rick's father bought the store. Rick then had massive seizures and he was in hospital at Foothills. Wendy Kinsman met Joyce Backs while she was at the Foothills Hospital as a nurse where both Rick and Bob Backs were. A while later Wendy and her husband Brian heard that the General Store was for sale and decided to explore the idea of buying it. They viewed the store in November of 1982 and took possession December 1, 1982. They operated the store until the night of December 22, 1988, when it caught fire in the middle of the night and burned down. They rebuilt the store as you see it now.

Mike Patterson and his wife Lesley bought the store in 1992. A building for Power Products when they tore the old storage building down. Banking was added by Kinsman and carried on by Pattersons. They were able to apply and got the AGLC liquor licence. Mike became the postmaster and Leslie was the bank representative. Sandy Kimball opened a travel agency in the old building where Brian was running Millarville Power products. The Patterson's stayed and raised their children and retired and sold in 2015.
