Easter Egg Nests

These egg nests are so fun and easy to make with your kids. You can customize the grass or eggs depending on what you prefer. This is the perfect Easter dessert for kids.

Prep Time: 15 mins Cook Time: 10 mins Resting Time: 1 hr Servings: 8

INGREDIENTS

3 tbsp Butter
4 1/2 cups Rice Cereal
10 oz bag Marshmallows
3/4 cup Shredded Coconut
Green Food Dye I like the gel food coloring
Small Easter Egg Candy or Jelly Beans
Muffin tin



INSTRUCTIONS

- Prepare your muffin tin with cooking spray. This insures the cereal doesn't stick.
- In a medium pan melt the butter. I like to wait until the butter becomes slightly brown (brown butter) for a caramelized flavor. This is totally optional, but just be sure to completely melt the butter.
- Turn the heat off. Add the marshmallows and stir until the marshmallows have melted down.
- Add the rice cereal 2 cups at a time to make sure it's all combined with the marshmallows. Add the additional rice cereal and stir.
- Use a plastic sandwich size bag with butter on the outside to help you spread the
 cereal mixture into the muffin tins. Press the mixture into the muffin tin and
 create an indent in the middle for the grass/eggs to lay.
- In a small bowl mix a small amount of green food dye with a small amount of water.
 Mix the coconut in the dye and spread out on a cookie sheet or aluminum foil so it can dry. This will be the grass for the nests. If you don't like coconut you could also use green frosting with a "grass" frosting tip.
- Wait at least an hour to ensure the cereal has set and cooled before assembling these.
- Once they have cooled sprinkle some grass in the middle of the nest. Top with your candy eggs and serve.

Hello Equine Members,


The MRAS riding rules, and sign-up sheet have been developed to help our members to have a safe and enjoyable time riding while also maintaining our building in good condition.

Manure: Please continue to clean up after your horses. I know the vast majority of you are excellent at this, but it continues to be a problem. Remove your horse's manure from the arena using the forks and wheelbarrows and transport it to the blue bins. Wheelbarrows should not be used for storage of manure; it belongs in the blue bins.

International Women's Day Tribute to my Mother, Joan (Burby) Merryfield Written by Marie Nyland



Joan was born on September 13, 1926. She was a third generation of pioneersRev. W.H. and Eliza Muncaster who homesteaded in 1907 south of Bragg Creek on Fish Creek. Joan started school at the age of five as the required number of children for the recently opened Two Pine School was short by one student. She rode her own horse two miles (3.2 km) to and from school along with her older brother John and older sister Margaret. Joan became an excellent rider and loved her horses. Her mother, Mary Burby, taught her skills like knitting, sewing, baking and cooking. She also worked outdoors not only in the garden but helped with the haying and brush cutting. Joan made many horseback trips to Bragg Creek to pick up the mail at Coates' Store (now the Trading Post). There were a few times that she and her sister rode to the Clem Gardner Ranch on Pirmez Creek to pick up te mail. This involved a long day ride over a distance of about 30 miles (48 kms) and a stop at Joe and Hester Robinson's ranch where they were always offered hospitality of a cup of tea and a meal.

During the war years, Joan's parents, Leo and Mary Burby often hosted members of the armed forces at their ranch. This is when Joan met her future husband. The Burby family was hosting members of the R.C.A.F and Flight Lieutenant Jack Merryfield was one of the guests. Jack was smitten with Joan. While training at #3 Wireless School at Shephard, Jack decided that he wanted to invite Joan to an up-coming dance at the Bragg Creek Round Hall. However, communication was a problem as the Burby's did not have a telephone and Jack was required to be training so he was not at liberty to drive out to the Burby ranch to invite her in person. So he solved the problem by flying a R.C.A.F. aircraft over the ranch, making a few passes over the ranch and dropping several hand-written notes out of the very pistol hole, scattering them over the pastures and bush of the Burby ranch. He lucked out as Joan's brother Bill while out riding found one of the notes...Joan accepted the invitation. Joan and Jack were married in the fall of 1946. They held their wedding dance at the Bragg Creek Round Hall and settled in the hamlet of Bragg Creek where they made their home for 51 years before moving to Redwood Meadows in 1997.

Joan and Jack had four children, George, Marie, Jim and Carol. For several years the family lived at Yoho Tinda, a log cabin motel owned by Bert Salene. Joan rented out a tourist cabins and did the laundry, cleaned the cabins and rode herd on her small children. At the time, Yoho Tinda was pretty much isolated from the hamlet with the Tsuut'ina boundary a short distance north of their home and no close neighbours so Joan had to be constantly vigilant for black bears and Clem Gardner's bulls which wandered in from time to time. Laundry was done on a gas-powered washing machine with water hauled from the Elbow River and heated on the wood stove. The family survived the Measles, Mumps and Scarlet Fever in their younger years with Joan nursing them. In the early 1950s Jack had purchased a small surplus oilfield home from Turner Valley, Oakalta Oils. The house was moved from Whiskey Row to a one-acre lot at Bragg Creek on Balsam Avenue. The power was supplied by a Delco generator, kerosine lamps. Heating continued to be wood and coal until natural gas became available. Water was from shallow well. Hard work was no stranger to Joan as with many other hardy pioneer women.

Laundry was done on a gas-powered washing machine with water hauled from the Elbow River and heated on the wood stove. The family survived the Measles, Mumps and Scarlet Fever in their younger years with Joan nursing them. In the early 1950s Jack had purchased a small surplus oilfield home from Turner Valley, Oakalta Oils. The house was moved from Whiskey Row to a one-acre lot at Bragg Creek on Balsam Avenue. The power was supplied by a Delco generator, kerosine lamps. Heating continued to be wood and coal until natural gas became available. Water was from shallow well. Hard work was no stranger to Joan as with many other hardy pioneer women.

As the family grew up, Joan took an interest in all of the activities her children were involved in and encouraged them to enjoy nature and wildlife. She made sure the family had an assortment of pets to care for and enjoy which she referred to as "the menagerie". Joan and Jack enjoyed young people and the house was often full of teenagers, mostly young people from the city whose families had cabins at Bragg Creek. It was a gathering place for many of them on weekends and summer holidays. Joan handed out the discipline when necessary to not only her own brood but anyone not behaving appropriately!



Joan was always ready to lend a hand with community projects and activities that her children were involved in. Joan was a strong supporter of the community of Bragg Creek. It was her idea that inspired the establishment of the Bragg Creek community grounds and community hall when she suggested that these lands might be acquired after the Bragg Creek School was permanently closed in the early 1960s.



Joan was an avid photographer and artist. She was an active member of the Bragg Creek Artisans, Bragg Creek Painters Group, founding member of the Bragg Creek Ladies Auxiliary, Bragg Creek Seniors and later the Redwood Meadows Seniors Group. For many years she wrote a weekly column in the Rockyview News. These columns were spiced with observations of wildlife, wildflowers and weather, community events, and humorous anecdotes.

Joan took an active interest in the history of Bragg Creek, Priddis and Millarville and helped with the collection of family histories for the Priddis, Millarville and Bragg Creek history book - Our Foothills. She was able to contribute a lot to the history of many of the people who had left the district and who had been family friends of her grandparents and her parents.

Joan also enjoyed excursions with Jack to their beloved Kananaskis County, camping, visiting family and friends and the annual Burby Family Reunion. She was proud to help celebrate her family's 102 years of ranching in the Bragg Creek area in 2009. Joan and Jack's Bragg Creek home still stands at 12 Balsam Avenue – appropriately called, "The Heart of Bragg Creek".


