

#### The Road to Bragg Creek - a personal account by G.J. "Jack" Merryfield

We are fortunate in these modern times to travel in our vehicles on paved highways and well-maintained roads. We are well aware that the roads in our foothills are not always easy to travel when challenges such as drifted snow and wet conditions are encountered. For many years Bragg Creek's groceries, mail and other necessities were transported from Calgary by Jack Elsdon, Harry White, John Fullerton, Bunny Purmal, and my father to name a few. The TransCanada Highway from Calgary west was not completed until 1962 so the route from Calgary in the early days was "The Twin Bridges Road" (now called Highway 8). Back then the Twin Bridges Road presented an assortment of challenges to motorists. The following personal account written by my father describes four obstacles that might be encountered on trips to and from Calgary.

"I first drove the Calgary to Bragg Creek Road during the summer of 1935, when five of us went on a camping trip to the mountains in our trusty 490 Chevrolet, with extra supplies such as cans of oil, gasoline, haywire and two spare tires. The next year, 1936, I made the same trip in my homemade Model T Ford "Bug". The road was dry, very dusty and full of chuck holes, but with an average of only three flat tires a day, both trips were a success. In 1946 I started "The Bragg Creek Truck Service" and for 22 years I learned what driving could be like over the miles of mostly dirt and sometimes gravel roads of those days. The Calgary to Bragg Creek Road had four obstacles, each one as good or as bad as the weather dictated. Fighting the road in rain or snow was bad enough, but the worst conditions of all were experienced during the annual spring thaw and break-up.

From Calgary, the first obstacle was the low-lying stretch of road on the west side of Twin Bridges (near present day Elbow Springs Golf Course). This rubbery piece of gumbo moved up and down as you drove over it, not daring to stop in case you broke through and became hopelessly bogged down. When it appeared to be at its worst, we would stop on the second bridge and probe with long sticks to find bottom through the broken surface of the gumbo, often pushing the sticks out of sight without touching bottom. Once past this hazard, we would continue across the flat to Morgan's Hill (near what is now Morgan's Rise sub-division. The grade has been substantially reduced).

Morgan's Hill, obstacle #2, was a maze of axle-deep ruts full of muck and water, with no way to pass if another vehicle came down the hill toward you. Sometimes that vehicle would manage to back up the hill to Morgan's gate, and other times the lower vehicle would have to back down to the bottom and then out would come the shovels, and enough mud and water would be removed to allow the vehicles to pass without bogging down. A well-founded saying in those days was, "If you can make it up Morgan's Hill you can probably make it to Bragg Creek."

The next strip of road west from Morgan's Hill was generally passable enough to get you as far as the turn north up Dawson Hill and down the other side before going on west to fight "obstacle #3", the notorious "six-mile stretch" to the Vince Robinson Ranch corner (today's traffic circle at Highway #22). This low-lying stretch of prairie road had practically no ditches to speak of and no drainage at all due to so much of the road surface being lower than the surrounding fields. Black mud and numerous deep ruts stretched westward for six long miles and at times impossible to negotiate. At such times, we would cut through the barbed wire fences and proceed as far west as possible over the comparatively solid fields of the nearby ranches, eventually coming back out on the passable stretches of the Bragg Creek Road. Tire and logging chains, boomers, shovels, axes, wire cutters, and fencing pliers were all part of our standard equipment then. Wire fences that were cut were quickly repaired before proceeding on with the hope that you would still make it to Bragg Creek that day. There were times when we had to bypass Dawson Hill and drive through the Matthews Stock Farm and out across their fields and eventually back onto the Bragg Creek Road.

Having finally reached Robinson's Corner, the road was generally not too bad from there to the Tsuut'ina Reserve boundary. (At that time the road skirted the Robinson's quarter section. The road went south of today's traffic circle for half a mile, then west for half a mile then north for half a mile then headed south at the Tsuut'ina Reserve boundary at today's Bragg Creek Paintball location). It was a twisting, winding road with a slight, almost unnoticeable up-hill grade through the trees to Bragg Creek with short stretches of road and approximately 17 corners not like today's paved road that has only seven corners. There were some winters though, when strong westerly winds blowing across Robinson's fields would cause the low-lying road to drift in solidly with wind-packed snow along the entire north-south stretch. One winter evening, on our way back to Bragg Creek with the loaded truck, my swamper (helper) and I shoveled snow for two hours and finally gave up and left the truck in the middle of the road. We hiked into Major William Atkinson's Horseshoe A Dude Ranch (later this ranch became Kamp Kiwanis in 1951) where they opened up a small cabin for us to spend the night. The next day with more help, we got the truck into the Robinson's field, where we broke trail all the way through to the Tsuut'ina Reserve, by-passing the drifted road.

Next came obstacle #4, the "home stretch" piece of road through the Tsuut'ina Reserve to Bragg Creek. Back then it was mostly sheltered by a coniferous forest, except for the open area known as Chicken Flats, (Redwood Meadows on one side and the Rodeo grounds on the other). Being more exposed it often drifted in solid during the winter and turned into a boggy, rutted mess in the springtime or during heavy June rains. During the spring thaw and break-up, the swollen waters of Chittem Spring would turn this section of road into a two-foot-deep river of flowing water. It was a bit annoying sometimes to be almost through to the other end of this river, to have your truck suddenly tip over to one side when you drove into a hidden washout. Then it was a job, with the help of Dave Jacobs, to round up poles for a tripod and with a chain block & tackle, hoist the truck upright and back onto solid roadbed. We often by-passed this piece of road by going through the fence and following a wagon trail through the bush and across the open area near today's Tsuut'ina Rodeo Grounds until finally coming back out to a more solid piece of road. Once during a bad spring, a municipal grader bogged down to where only the top half of the big wheels showed above the muck.

Some of the local people including the truckers would donate a few dollars each to a "kitty" which was kept in the Bragg Creek Post Office/Store as a means of paying anyone who could be found with a bulldozer to plow our snow-bound roads. Sometimes a plow would come into our Improvement District from the Municipality of Springbank and do the job for us. Generally speaking, it was the dual-wheeled trucks that kept the drifted roads open in those days. One wintry day in the 1950's with my partly loaded truck from Bragg Creek it took about three hours of bucking drifts to get to the top of Morgan's Hill, at which time we managed to shovel out a turn-around and plow through the same drifts for a two-hour trip back to Bragg Creek. Situations often occurred where two vehicles approaching each other in the single snow-rutted road could not normally pass without one or both becoming stuck in deep snow, so a by-pass had to be shoveled out. If one vehicle was a truck the practice then was to have the lighter car run off into the deep snow and the truck, after passing on the solid track, would back up and tow the car back onto the track.

For the Easter holidays, some Calgary businessmen would drive out and leave their families at their cottages in Bragg Creek, but often a heavy wet spring snowstorm prevented their return to pick them up. At times like this, I took the outside dual wheels off my truck and chained up the single wheels and picked up a family and their gear and headed off down the road to Vince Robinson's back gate (across the road from today's Bragg Creek Paintball). I would then follow the wagon trail east through the trees and across the dry irrigation ditch and onwards past the Robinson ranch buildings and finally out to the main gate (where the traffic circle is now) where a car from Calgary would pick them up for the rest of the trip home. Many of these Calgary people made it a habit of loading their cars with stones, sand or whatever when coming to or leaving Bragg Creek, and dumping the stuff into mud holes etc., and so helping in the endless battle of trying to make the road passable."
